**Subject: Representation regarding National Status for PRLIS, OBC Census Enumeration, Inclusive Women's Representation and Presidential assent for Telangana's BC Bills.**

Respected Prime Minister,

I am writing to you as a concerned citizen to bring to your immediate attention, four matters of critical importance to the people of Telangana and the broader pursuit of social justice in India:

1. Granting of "National Status" to the Palamuru-RangaReddy Lift Irrigation Scheme (PRLIS): The PRLIS is not merely an infrastructure project; it is the lifeline for lakhs of farmers across the perennially drought-prone districts of Mahabubnagar, Ranga Reddy, and Nalgonda. It is designed to irrigate approximately 12,31,020 acres, a scale far exceeding several projects that have already been granted National Status, such as the Upper Bhadra in Karnataka or Gosi Khurd in Maharashtra. Given the geographical necessity and the project's potential to transform the rural economy of South Telangana, I urge your administration to accord it National Status to ensure 90% central funding and expedited completion.



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2. Inclusion of a Dedicated OBC Column in Census 2027: Scientific planning requires accurate data. While the Mandal Commission estimated the OBC population at 52%, the absence of a contemporary, caste-based enumeration leaves a massive section of our citizenry in a state of "statistical invisibility." To ensure that the fruits of development reach the last mile, it is imperative that an exclusive OBC Column be incorporated in the upcoming Census 2027. This data is the only way to ensure equitable distribution of resources and representation.

3. Reintroduction of the Women's Reservation Bill with an OBC sub-quota: While the push for 33% reservation for women in Parliament and State Assemblies is a historic necessity, it must be inclusive to be truly democratic. Without an OBC sub-quota, the reservation risks benefiting only those from traditionally dominant social backgrounds, further marginalizing women from backward communities. I request that once the census is completed, the Bill be reintroduced with a clear provision for an OBC sub-quota to ensure "Equality of Opportunity" for all women.

4. Expediting Presidential Assent for Telangana's Backward Classes Bills: The Telangana Legislative Assembly has passed two Bills and an ordinance seeking to increase reservations for Backward Classes to 42% in education, employment, and local bodies. These are currently awaiting the Honorable President's assent. As seen in the case of Tamil Nadu, the 50% cap on reservations is not an absolute barrier when the social realities of a state demand an upward revision. I request your kind intervention to facilitate and expedite this assent to fulfill the aspirations of 52% of Telangana's population.



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I believe that addressing these four pillars: water security, data-driven justice, gender equity, and constitutional safeguards will go a long way in strengthening the federal spirit of our nation. I look forward to a positive consideration of these requests.
